07 AWARDED RESULTS SUMMARY

07a KS4 Awarded Results

LW presented the KS4 awarded results. Results have been analysed using the data management system, SISRA. Further analysis will take place following centre review outcomes. At the time of this meeting, no national comparison data was available

- There were 270 students in the 2021 KS4 cohort, 125 girls and 145 boys. Of these, 39 were DA, 8 SEN, 1 LAC and 8 EAL. This is the first cohort to be measured on the new KS2
- There has been an increase in Basics 4+ & 5+ for the past 2 years
- A8 has increased and is now back in line with 2018
- EBacc entry has dropped to just above 50% but still remains above national
- Over 100 students recruited into 6th Form so far, final numbers TBC
- High Ability cohort of 116: A8 62.18, P8+0.50
- Middle Ability cohort of 127: A8 46.28, P8 +0.74
- Lower Ability cohort of 24: A8 24.28, P8 +0.09
- SEN 5 cohort of 29: A8 34.42, P8 -0.24
- EHCP cohort of 8: A8 19.38, P8 -0.27
- DA have a A8 of 45.04 and a P8 of +0.12. Both are an improvement on 2020 and the gap continues to close. Improving outcomes for DA students continues to be a focus area
- Girls have achieved higher than the boys

- English Language & Literature and Maths continue to perform above the national average across all grades
- Successful subjects include DT: Food Technology, PE, German, History, Computer Science & Geography at GCSE
- 2 vocational subjects Health & Social Care and Performing Arts continue to do well
- Underperforming subjects include BTEC Sport (SPI -1.21), Design Technology (SPI -0.88) and OCR Enterprise & Marketing (SPI -0.74)
- Leadership Development priorities for 2021/2022:
 - Reduce the gap between DA and non-DA
 - Improve outcomes for Upper Ability boys
 - Improve outcomes for Middle Ability girls in Maths
- C: (SK) In 2019 we took significant action and looked at the longer-term strategy. We have clear curriculum development, have targeted the gaps and have benefitted from strong leadership
- C: (RF) As a parent I applaud the different styles and the great work done with intervention Q: (RF) How did the Sciences perform?
- SK: Really well, we had a pass rate of 100% at Grade 4 and above. Grades 5 & 7 were in line with the national average
- C: (AP) We reviewed what worked from last year and what didn't
- Q: (AP) Are there any continued ideas for raising DA aspirations?
- LW: We have a focus on DA students every fortnight. We look at their attendance and whether or not they have access to a laptop or pc at home. All PP students completed a survey and individual profiles have been set up for each one and are monitored by both teaching and nonteaching staff
- C: (LT) We have retained 61% of DA students into 6th Form and this is a direct result of the support they get lower down in the school
- C: (LW) We have provided over 100 laptops for Yrs10 & 11 and helped with home engagement. We are regularly assessing and monitoring
- C: (SK) We also capitalised on the use of online resources last year and those that benefitted we have carried forward. All Yr11 logged on to the first week of the tutor programme Q: (RF) Did the practical subjects suffer as a result of lockdown?
- LW: It varied. They didn't have a project as such last year and the practical element is where some students make up their grades
- Q: (SM) What about Music, Drama and Art?
- LW: We had time-reduced exams in Drama and Music and we also had help from CHS with
- SK: Yr10 Art came in for summer school and that was really positive for them
- Q: (SM) Some of the improvements in Maths are down to the videos made during lockdown. What else has contributed to this improvement?
- LW: The school being open once more is certainly the main focus and we are also continuing with online learning in some areas via My Tutor and Yipiyap
- C: (SK) The fact that Maths had a combination of online and class lessons has been critical for success

07b KS5 Awarded Results

LT presented the KS5 awarded results.

The 2020/2021 priorities were developing the breadth and depth of CEIAG provision Post-16 and focussing on high quality transition arrangements. The 3rd priority of embedding good attendance and punctuality was scaled down due to the pandemic

The cohort had an average APS of 6.19 for academic and 5.45 for vocational

- Value Added for academic subjects is +0.50 and +0.62 for vocational
- Of the 66 students, 38.1% achieved A*A and 69.8% achieved A*B making a 100% academic pass rate
- Overall VA was 0.51

Q: (RF) There was a significant dip in student numbers for 2021, are you expecting it to improve any further? I know we are now sitting at 106 for 2021/2022 and a lot would not have coped on Level 3 and with Wolfreton not offering Level 2 we took a hit

SK: It's also dipped at KS4. We had lots of in year admissions and Maths was not where it needed to be in 2019. We improved Maths outcomes and in doing so improved the chance to access Level 3 courses

C: (LW) We also had small cohorts

C: (LT) Smaller cohort equals smaller class sizes. The teachers are able to spend more time with each student

Q: (HP) What is the maximum you can take in for 6^{th} Form?

SK: 132

Q: (HP) Do you recruit from Wolfreton only?

LT: No, we also recruit externally but the bulk are Wolfreton students

C: (SM) It's good that 6th Form can travel between Hessle and Cottingham too

Academic headlines:

- Top end grades have increased from 2020
- 12% of grades achieved were A* (9% in 2020)
- 36% of grades achieved were A*A (32% in 2020)
- 70% of grades achieved were A*B (28% in 2020)
- Average grade was B

Vocational headlines

- Top end grades have increased in 2021
- 70% achieved D*D (54% in 2020). 53% of these were D* grades (22% in 2020)
- Pass rate maintained at 100%
- Overall VA for 2021: A Level +0.51, Applied General +0.62. National figure is 0.0

C: (LT) Online work during lockdown gave the students a purpose, something to strive for. Competition was high with this cohort and the teachers fed off this. Now we just have to sustain the momentum with the larger cohort for 2021/2022

Successful subjects include

- Law
- Psychology
- English Literature
- H&S Care BTEC
- Geography
- PE
- History
- English Language
- Biology

All subjects, with the exception of Art, had a positive VA

Areas of concern include Japanese and French. Each member of a small cohort has a significant effect on results

- Teacher of Japanese has spent time after school and during the holidays working to close the gaps at GCSE
- French takes place at Cottingham. However, all travelling students have support at WS too

Q: (RW) There seems to be PE success at GCSE but Yr13 are requiring attention. Why is this? LT: They struggle with the Anatomy and Physiology paper. Staff and the exam boards are in contact and we are working on enhancing the Year 12 paper for Year 13. It is a work in progress

Q: (RW) So we should start to see progress in the next couple of years?

LT: Yes

Q: (SM) Is there evidence travellers fare worse than home students?

LT: Yes, we have looked at this as a team. It's not a clear-cut pattern as some excel and some don't. It is constantly monitored and intervention sessions are being considered C: (SK) Strategic leadership is good to raise at 6th Form. All 6th Form Heads meet with the 6th Form Manager. This is beneficial to all as they now all have access to live SISRA data C: (LT) It is a great help being able to data share

Performance by Group

- Improved overall APS per entry for boys and girls compared to 2020
- DA cohort of 7 improved in all outcomes but there was a dip in APS for Tech Level
- SEND (3 SEND, 1 EHCP) dipped in academic VA but increased significantly in Applied General VA
- KS5 bursary cohort significantly improved in all outcomes

08 LEARNER RETURN TO SCHOOL ANALYSIS

SK stated it had been a very positive return to school. Over 1954 LFTs had been carried out over 6 days during the staggered start to the year and SK extended her thanks to all involved for their commitment to ensuring everything ran as smoothly as possible

- The training day on 06 September was used to prepare stations for testing and also to look at the curriculum approach
- Attendance had largely been good but testing has impacted on the numbers with Yrs
 7 11 logging 93.2% attendance last Thursday
- The Attendance Manager is monitoring the approach and house teams have been set up to support
- No issues reported with behaviour and attitude
- Roll call continues to provide a calm start to the day
- The move from vertical tutoring to year group during lockdown has been maintained due to its success
- Assemblies have had a positive impact
- Students have responded incredibly well to the mobile ban onsite
- Over 55, 000 rewards awarded so far with the Top 20 enjoying a Hot Chocolate Friday
- Detention and isolation numbers remain low
- The 2 extra minibuses purchased have allowed more learners to get to extracurricular activities
- Drop Everything and Read programme extended to include Yr10

Q: (RF) Has the new structure of the day impacted on PE at all?

SK: The Head of PE is working positively with us and has reintroduced super-curricular activities. On another note, we have received lots of positive feedback regarding the lunch and breaktimes. They are much calmer, the queues are shorter and there is always somewhere to sit

Q: (AP) Have you noticed any changes in attendance since lockdown? Has it increased or decreased?

SK: It is varied. Some absence is Covid-related with learners afraid to return to school or having to isolate. We are monitoring it very closely
