Nightingale

Named after Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing and famous for her work in the Crimean War. Nightingale's shield reflects her faithful service to nursing and improving the lives of others. As Nightingale students we endeavour to bring these attributes into our own lives.



Owen

Named after Robert Owen, the founder of the co-operative movement. Owen's shield reflects his readiness to serve. He was known not only for his entrepreneurial skills, but also for supporting others. These qualities are those we seek to develop as students in Owen House.



Rowntree

Named after Joseph Rowntree, a determined businessman and philanthropist. Rowntree's shield reflects virtue and learning and his commitment to education and charitable causes. As Rowntree students we aim to emulate this commitment to education and learning.



Tomlinson

Named after Jane Tomlinson, CBE, an amateur athlete who raised substantial amounts for charity, despite suffering from terminal cancer. Tomlinson's shield reflects strength and the ability to complete seemingly impossible challenges. As Tomlinson students we aim to rise to meet challenges head on.



Wilberforce

Named after William Wilberforce, the leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade and a philanthropist. Wilberforce's shield reflects conscience and honour against evil. These are values we aspire to as Wilberforce students.

Teaching and Learning

At Wolfreton we work hard to engage and motivate all learners in a supportive yet challenging learning environment. Our approach to achieving this is underpinned by what we call **The Wolfreton Way**; the promotion of what we judge to be important in life – the principles or standards of Excellence, Endeavour and Respect.

We support the professionalism of the teacher to deliver unique and innovative lessons, empowering students to take responsibility and develop confidence in independent work. Our core principles of learning are grounded

in 'Teaching to the Top', providing challenge for all students with scaffolded support for each young person to fulfil their potential.

We offer a balanced and broadly based curriculum that promotes:

- successful learners, who enjoy learning, make progress and achieve
- confident individuals, who are able to live safe, healthy and fulfilling lives
- responsible citizens, who make a positive contribution to society
- the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of students

Key Stage 3

In Years 7, 8 and 9 all students follow the national curriculum. This consists of:

Sixth Form

Our diverse Key Stage 5 curriculum offers students the opportunity to follow their own strengths and interests, building on what they have achieved at Key Stage 4. Students choose a programme of study from a very wide range of A level, Tech level and BTEC courses, which are available both at Wolfreton and as part of The Consortium. Many Sixth Form students also complete the Extended Project Qualification to develop their independent learning skills as they approach higher education or the workplace. A full range of enrichment opportunities are also open to all Sixth Form students.

Our School

We value high standards and individual aspirations, and work hard to motivate and support all of our students to achieve their best academically and in sporting, linguistic and artistic interests.

Challenge for all

We encourage all students to maximise their potential, including our most able students and those who have a particular talent. Provision for our more able and talented students begins in lessons and extends to include a range of enrichment activities. Learning Support



Sport and enrichment

Wolfreton achieves outstanding success in sport and has a long standing sporting tradition. We aim to develop individual interests and enthusiasm for sport and emphasise the importance of co-operation and teamwork as well as the desire for excellence.





Students at Wolfreton are able to participate in a wide range of extra-curricular activities. These provide opportunities both for those who have existing interests and for those who feel like trying something new. Highlights have included Rock Challenge, choir and orchestra, whole school productions, Streetdance shows, History Debating and Japanese clubs. Students also have the opportunity to take on a leadership role as a House Council Rep or as a Peer Mentor, where they are trained to support others by providing friendship and activities at lunchtime sessions.

As a school, we believe that educational visits can enhance learning and development in many ways. Over recent years students have visited the WW1 memorials and Auschwitz with History, Hull Truck and the Yorkshire Playhouse with Drama, taken part in funded work experience in France and Spain and enjoyed the annual ski trip to Italy's Aosta Valley, always a popular choice.



Our Sixth Form

Wolfreton Sixth Form College is a large and successful institution with on average around 170 students. Students know their teachers, and teachers know their students. Such an individual and personal approach is one of our core strengths. This is one of the reasons so many of our top performing GCSE students choose to continue their education studying A levels at Wolfreton.

The Sixth Form is based on the top floor in our fantastic building and Sixth Form students have their own facilities. This includes specialised teaching seminar rooms, independent learning facilities and a refectory.







Our teachers are experts in their fields and many of our staff are examiners for exam boards and verifiers for vocational qualifications. This level of experience across all departments ensures that students receive the highest quality teaching from staff who have in depth knowledge of, and passion for, their subject.

Sixth Form students at Wolfreton are considered leaders. Annually, the staff and students elect a Head Boy and Head Girl. These roles are important as they represent the student body, providing a communication link between staff, students and the local community. The Sixth Form Council is run by and for the students. It co-ordinates social events, the Prom and charity events as well as promoting the College. The Council liaises with the Students Services Manager to improve the Sixth Form student experience.

Sixth Form students also mentor younger students at school and enjoy the opportunities that working alongside them present.





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
